- Grow some bee-friendly plants and see if they attract bees to your garden.
- Find out about the challenges faced by bees and the consequences for people if there were no bees. Create a poster headed “No Bees, No Me” to present your findings.
- Sing “I’m taking home my baby bumble bee”. You may be able to make up your own verse.
- Do some research about the anatomy of bees. Draw a picture and mark on the various body parts.
- Make your own bumble bee using any materials you like (plenty of ideas on the internet if you need inspiration)
- Organise for a bee keeper to visit your Unit and talk about their job and their experiences.
- Learn first aid treatment for bee stings and know how to identify and treat an anaphylaxis reaction.
- Find out the role of the bee in pollination. Identify other animals that pollinate our flowers and food sources.
- Identify and explain the difference between queen, drone and worker bees.
- Describe different types of honey. You may even like to perform a taste test.
- Explain how bees make honey and where the wax comes from.
- Find out about the “Waggle Dance” performed by bees. Give it a go with your friends.
- Investigate the different ways that honey was used in the past.
- Research different items that can be made from bees wax. Choose one to try for yourself.
- Make a recipe using honey.
- Chocolate easter eggs are often made with a honeycomb-like pattern to hide imperfections. Decorate an easter egg however you like.
